***Housing Celebrates Fair Housing Month;
Releases Annual State of Fair Housing in Northeast Ohio Report
Finds Housing Discrimination Complaints Remains High:
Most Still Based on Race and Disability***

The Housing Research & Advocacy Center, in celebration of Fair Housing Month, released its fifth annual "The State of Fair Housing In Northeast Ohio: April 2010" report. The report found that although complaints of housing discrimination in Northeast Ohio decreased by 10 percent in 2009 compared to 2008, the number remained significantly higher than the average number of complaints filed in the last 20 years and represented the second highest yearly total since 1990.

The report, based on the number of complaints filed in the region with the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), found that 223 complaints were filed in 2009, compared to 254 in 2008 and a 20-year average of 125.2 complaints in the region. The Housing Center's report also examined trends in discrimination complaints over the last ten years, finding an 85% increase in complaints filed from 2005-2009, when an average of 181.6 complaints were filed each year, compared to the previous five-year period, when the yearly average was 98. This increase was due to a 64.3% increase in the number of cases based on

disability and a 60.9% increase in the number of cases based on race.

The Housing Center estimates that there are annually at least 33,690 instances of housing discrimination in the region against African Americans, Hispanics/Latinos, and Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders in the rental and sales markets, meaning the vast majority of cases are never reported to a government agency.

"The State of Fair Housing in Northeast Ohio: April 2010", is the Housing Center's fifth annual comprehensive survey of fair housing in Northeast Ohio, analyzing housing discrimination and segregation in a six-county region (Ashtabula, Cuyahoga, Geauga, Lake, Lorain, and Medina Counties). The study further found that the number of cases brought based on familial status, national origin, sex/gender, and religion also increased; that the most common bases of discrimination alleged were race, disability, and familial status; and that over the 20-year period, 1990-2009, cases filed alleging race discrimination accounted for 39.6% of the total,

compared to 23.4% for disability, 19.3% for familial status. From 1990-2009, almost three-quarters of the complaints (73.9%) were filed in Cuyahoga County.

The report, which can be downloaded from the website, www.thehousingcenter.org, recommends enacting stronger local fair housing laws, restoring Ohio's fair housing law to make it equivalent to federal fair housing laws at all levels, strengthening the commitment of governments that receive federal funds to "affirmatively further fair housing," creating a federal Consumer Financial Protection Agency, increasing monitoring and investigations of mortgage lenders, implementing comprehensive education efforts, ensuring that all online housing advertisements fully comply with fair housing laws, and providing government incentives and other creative solutions to combat housing discrimination and racial and economic segregation.

"The State of Fair Housing in Northeast Ohio" report received press coverage on Cleveland's NPR affiliate, WCPN.

Cleveland, Akron and Summit County Pass Inclusive Municipal Non-Discrimination Ordinances

Cleveland City Council voted 21-0 to protect against discrimination in employment, housing and public accommodations based on gender identity and expression. Akron voted 10-2 to do the same based on both sexual orientation and gender identity, and Summit County voted 11-1 to pass a countywide ordinance protecting against discrimination in employment, housing and public accommodations based on sexual orientation and gender identity.

Texas Fair Housing Lawsuit Settled

Under the terms of a Conciliation Agreement approved by HUD in May, the State of Texas will conduct updated research into impediments to fair housing in the state and ensure that disaster recovery housing spending "affirmatively furthers fair housing."

The agreement arises from a lawsuit brought by Texas Low Income Housing Information Service and Texas Appleseed against the State of Texas. As a result of the lawsuit, HUD had withheld \$1.7 billion in Community Development Block Grant funds that had been appropriated for hurricane recovery efforts because of concerns about the state's failure to address fair

housing and affordable housing needs in its programs. Under the agreement, 55% of the money will be spent to help low- and moderate-income families. In addition, the state will rebuild all of the public housing units that were destroyed in Galveston and create new programs to help low-income and minority residents find housing in less-segregated or storm-vulnerable areas.

The groups were represented by the law firm of Relman, Dane & Colfax, which is co-counsel in one of the Housing Center's current accessibility cases.

HUD Adds Important Civil Rights Protections to Its Grant Programs

For the first time in its history, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) will require grant applicants seeking HUD funding to comply with state and local anti-discrimination laws that protect lesbian, gay, bi-sexual, and transgender (LGBT) individuals. Traditionally, HUD requires all applicants for competitive grant funding to comply with all applicable federal fair housing and civil rights requirements. Now HUD will further stipulate that applicants and their sub-recipients must comply with state or local laws proscribing housing discrimination based on sexual orientation or gender identity.
