

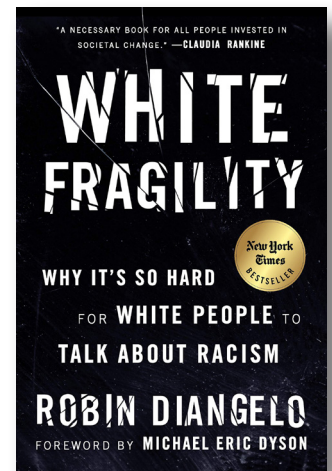
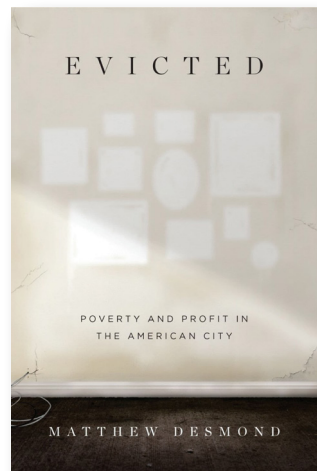
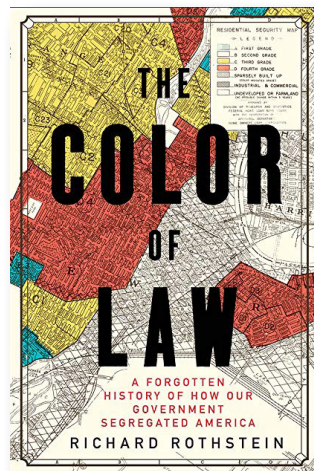
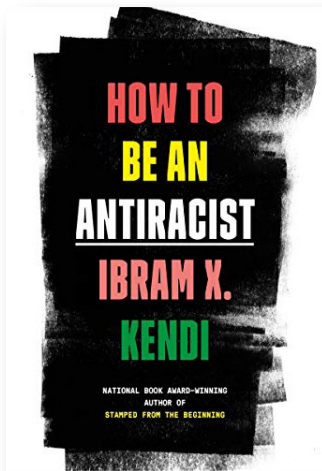
Celebrate **Fair Housing Month**
